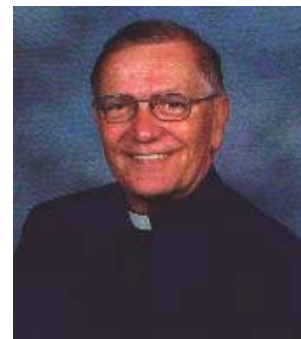

As we approach Holy Week, we are directed by the Church, once again, to recall the Passion, Death and Resurrection of Christ. As the grandeur and power of Christ were unequivocally manifested on the Cross, so the glorification of Christ strikingly appeared in the Resurrection. The greatness of Christ on the Cross stands out because his sufferings were freely accepted in fulfillment of a divine plan and also because of the majesty with which he bore those sufferings. Christ had the power to make atonement

for the sins of every human being, for Christ is God and Christ is man. And Christ made atonement for our sins because he loved God and he loved us. His great love made him obedient "even unto death of the Cross." He arose by his own power and is the cause of our resurrection. As God, Our Lord raised himself up from the dead; but as man, he was raised by the Father, and thus Holy Scripture sometimes attributes the Resurrection to the Father and sometimes to Christ. The meritorious cause was, of course, the Passion and Death of Christ.

And so Holy Week has its purpose the remembrance of Christ Passion, Death and Resurrection. It begins with Our Lord's entrance into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday; continues with the Mass of the Last Supper on Holy Thursday; the Church reflects on the Passion of Christ Good Friday; its high point is culminated in the Easter Vigil, or Holy Saturday evening. The word which describes the entire event is Alleluia! The stone rejected by the builders has become the cornerstone. "If we have died with Christ, we shall also rise with him" (Romans 8).

When Father McGivney founded the Knights, he wanted local councils to organize and conduct fraternal activities to benefit members, the parish and the community at large. He was especially concerned with widows and orphans, because he knew firsthand what it meant to lose the father and breadwinner in the family. His own father died when he was a young seminarian. For Father McGivney, the most important fraternal benefit his Knights could provide was financial assistance to members' families affected by the untimely death of a breadwinner.



Father McGivney had a pastor's heart matched with the penchant for practical and effective action. Under his direction, the Knights of Columbus replaced the practice of passing the hat to help a deceased member's family with a new structure that offered life insurance to its members. The pooling of insurance premiums at the Supreme Council created the basis for a financially sound program, and helped relieve local councils of the burden of supporting its widows and their families. There is not need to pass the hat upon a brother's death. Life insurance is our greatest fraternal benefit. I urge each member to take advantage of this valuable program.

Chasing Roe Broken Eggs and All - CHAP. 5 – Epilog



As I have pointed out in the first four chapters, Roe established the right of Mother to an abortion in the First Trimester, with different rules for each of the subsequent semesters, so as to protect the health, safety and welfare of the mother. That was modified to the Mother has the right to abortion prior to viability, and the State has the right to protect the health, safety and welfare of both mother and the unborn. Then the Court held that a partial birth abortion is never justified, and the Court upheld the Federal Partial Birth Ban Act.

There are two other fronts affecting the issue. The first was the New Hampshire Parental Notification Act was upheld as constitutional, reversing the decisions below...outlining the protection of parent-child relations. The other is that the Court pulled the teeth of the Pro-abortion group by taking away most, if not all, possible causes of action for damage claims against the pro-life causes.

In chapter 5, I outline what I believe is necessary for change, to begin where all cases begin at the trial court, developing the issues, bringing in the experts, and capitalizing on the gains achieved.

The true rule, the ultimate goal, then is this: *A woman is not entitled to an abortion ever, however when her, or the unborn's, health, safety or welfare is at risk, she may terminate the pregnancy in a manner, and at a time which protects the health, safety and welfare of both mother and the unborn homo sapien, insofar as practical, recognizing that it may not always be possible to save both, or either.*

"Send not for whom the Constitution secures the blessings of liberty – it secures the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our Posterity. If any of ourselves, including the mother, or our Posterity, including the unborn homo sapiens), can be declared not a citizen, **then none of us are safe!**"

Congratulations to the Rick and Jeni Rillera family our January 2008 family of the Month

Rick and Jeni have been married for forty-nine (49) years and have lived in the Sacramento area for two years. They have a son, Larry Rillera, two daughters, Carla San Vicente, and Lisa Reinelt, and nine grandchildren. Prior to moving to Sacramento, the family resided in the city of Orange and were parishioners of Holy Family Cathedral for thirty-five years.

Rick and Jeni's families provided a strong Catholic influence on both of them, which has extended down to their own children. Rick's father and mother were employees of St Joseph Hospital from 1933 to their retirement, and priests and nuns were a constant influence on him and his siblings. All of Rick's family, as well as Jeni's family are Catholic educated. Rick and his two brothers, his sister, and a niece attended St Joseph School, and Mater Dei HS in Santa Ana. Jeni and her two sisters and two brothers attended St Ann's School, and also Mater Dei. Larry, Carla, and Lisa attended Holy Family School.

As parishioners of Holy Family Cathedral, Rick and Jeni served as Eucharistic Ministers for twelve years, and were members of Holy Family's St Vincent de Paul Conference for ten years, of which Rick served as President for one year.

Rick and Jeni are very active in two of our parishes, St Ignatius and Our Lady of the Assumption. Rick serves as Mass Lecturer at both parishes. At St Ignatius, Jeni is involved in a Prayer Group, a Study Group, and the St Ignatius "Respect for Life Ministry".

Rick is a rather new member to the Knights of Columbus, and to Council 4970, having joined the Knights about a year ago, but he quickly became an important and integral part of the council, as he accepted the role of Council Lecturer and is a member of our Fraternal Committee.



Rick retired in 2000 from a much storied career, having been self-employed in a variety of professions, most notably in music

entertainment and promotion, and finally in property management. Rick and his two brothers were musicians from early childhood and played with their own group and other notable bands and musical groups. They joined the surfing craze band of Dick Dale and the Del Tones and were asked to join the 1st RHYTHM AND BLUES BAND at Disneyland in Anaheim and performed there for ten years.

Later, Bill Medley and Bobby Hatfield formed a new duo in Orange County and they asked Rick and his brothers to join them on their first album. They were known as the RIGHTEOUS BROTHERS (WOW!). Rick and his brothers worked with them from the early sixties, until Bobby's death. Traveling on the road and recording in the United States, including Hawaii and Canada proved to be rather difficult for Rick and his family, so he decided to retire. Since the family's arrival in Sacramento, Rick has been involved in church activities noted above.
