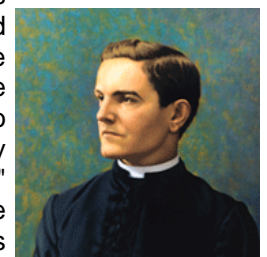

Chatting with Fr. Ted

.....Fr. Ted Wroblicky

*An associate of mine asked me to review an article for publication that she had prepared. I thought the article to be quite good and now wish to share it with you. - Fr. Ted.*

**EVERYBODY IS DOING IT!** In his 1981 encyclical *Familiaris consortio* Pope John Paul II teaches us that Christian families are faced with a dilemma. Do we follow traditional teachings regarding marriage and the family or do we accept what appears to be the “norm” in our society. If you have reached “middle-age,” much of what you hear and see in movies, TV, magazines, newspapers and on the Internet is not supportive of ‘what you learned in catechism as a child or in classes about marriage and family life.’ Divorce, abortion, sterilization, and freedom and independence from God (thinking “I can do whatever I like”) are a few examples of concepts that are at odds with what we believe as Catholics and Christians.

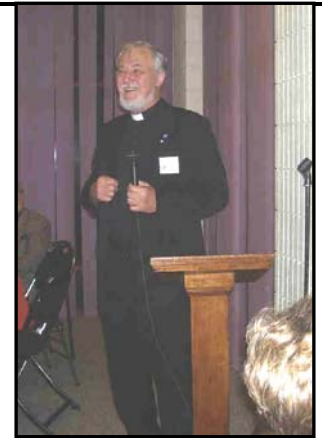
Dr. Joseph Atkinson, Assistant Professor of Sacred Scripture at John Paul II University in Washington, DC, summarizes Pope John Paul II’s position this way: “The question ... which stands before us ... is whether or not marriage and the family have a specific immutable structure, or are merely a social reality controlled and defined by political power and advocates of social engineering. The struggle is between two diametrically opposed views of reality. It is the fundamental problem of modern times and has rightly been called the culture war ... one view leads to the culture of death, the other to the culture of life.” (*The Anthropological Foundations of Familiaris consortio*)

So we in the domestic church are faced with trying to teach our children what the Church teaches--the sanctity of marriage, the value of human life, the importance of being of service to others--when the society often teaches something else. How do you answer your children, especially when they are teens and young adults, and/or your friends, when they say “everybody is doing it.” What is the correct response to “everybody gets divorced” or “everybody gets an abortion” or “the nuclear family is no longer Mom, Dad and the kids” or “everybody lives together before they get married (if they ever even do get married)”?

Pope John Paul II tells us that we must face such questions with courage and interior serenity. We must patiently remind others that abstinence before marriage is still the Christian ideal; that marriages are indissoluble; that abortion is the death of a child; that a nuclear Christian family is made up of father, mother, and children, if they have been blessed with children. And when our loved ones stray from these values, we must remember to hate the sin but love the sinner. We must keep the lines of communication open between family members. And we must reconcile and forgive whenever possible. Yet we must hold firm to the truth. It is our Christian duty to do so.

Ultimately, by rejecting modern secular values regarding God, marriage and the family and supporting the teachings of the Church in our own families, we will help transform the world. Pope John Paul II exhorts us to listen again to Paul VI: “The family, like the Church, ought to be a place where the Gospel is transmitted and from which the Gospel radiates. In a family that is conscious of this mission, all the members evangelize and are evangelized. The parents not only communicate the Gospel to their children, but from their children they can themselves receive the same Gospel as deeply lived by them. And such a family becomes the evangelizer of many other families and of the neighborhood of which it forms a part.” This is what we are all called to do.

Two stories of where "human beings" were brought into the world when just a few months prior to delivery, the mothers were on the verge of abortions, were discussed at our April Planning meeting. Twins were born in one case, and the other case a healthy youngster was born even though the doctors were recommending an abortion due to probable abnormalities in the baby. More and more of these real life situations are occurring. An April 2008 article published by the American Family Association noted that according to The Washington Post, between 2000 and 2005 the rate at which women of childbearing age aborted a child dropped 9%. Mark Crutcher, founder and president of the pro-life organization Life Dynamics, said the pro-life position is winning converts. He said that over the last few years, polls have consistently shown a dramatic shift toward the pro-life position. For example, a Gallup Poll last year found that 51% of Americans viewed abortion as "morally wrong," up from 45% in 2001.

Judie Brown, president of the American Life League has found that there is an important demographic trend in this public opinion change. "The progress that's being made is being made at the grassroots level, by converting the hearts and minds of the American public – especially young people," she said. "[W]e see a dramatic shift in the attitudes of individuals between the ages of 18 and 30."

The ubiquity of the Internet has only facilitated the spread of such pro-life information. "I don't think it's any coincidence at all that the American people's position on abortion began to change dramatically toward the pro-life side at the same moment that the Internet became a reality," Crutcher said. When the Internet came online, "the godless, leftist, pro-abortion American secular media lost its monopoly on the flow of information" to the American people. "And when that happened, the American people began to take a second look at abortion ... and we started winning."

Crutcher compared the pro-life movement to a baseball team that's ahead in the seventh inning but is not guaranteed a win. "We have to keep our shoulder to the wheel, so to speak, and not give the American abortion industry one moment's peace as long as they're slaughtering babies," he said. "And I think that's the main thing that pro-lifers need to understand."

## FAMILY OF THE MONTH... GERALD MARENICH, PGK, AND TODD WILSON, FAMILY DIRECTORS



Each month, Arden-Carmichael Council 4970 honors a Brother member and his family who exemplify the values taught by our Church and our Order. Congratulations to **Brother James Hagarty**, our Family of the Month for March.

James Hagarty is a member of St. John the Evangelist Parish in Carmichael. He, and his wife, Beverly, who passed away in October 2004, moved from San Mateo to Carmichael in 1982. While in San Mateo, they were members of St. Gregory Parish, where they were both active in parish life. Beverly for example, headed up the Parish CCD program for a number of years while James taught in the high school religion program. James now serves as an usher at St. Johns.

James and Beverly had six children; James, a U.S. attorney in the State of Washington; Patricia, in automobile sales, Abilene, Texas; Richard, a bank Executive V.P. in San Jose; Robert, a teacher at Natomas Pacific Pathways Prep School in Sacramento; Denis, teaches at the College of the Siskiyou; and Sharon, living in Folsom works in investment counseling. The Hagarty Family also includes 13 grandchildren and 6 great grandchildren.

Jim is a WW II Navy veteran, serving aboard the USS Wadsworth, a navy destroyer, in the Pacific Theater of Operations; he took part in the invasions of Iwo Jima and Okinawa.

Following the war in 1946 while living in the Bay Area, James married Beverly, obtained employment with Pacific Telephone Co in San Francisco, and began his education at the University of San Francisco {a busy year!!}.

In 1953, after completing his studies at the University and the USF Law School, he received his Law degree {Juris Doctor} and passed the Bar Exam in 1954.

In 1981, James was offered an appointment to the California Unemployment Insurance Appeals Board, by then Governor Jerry Brown. He accepted the offer and took early retirement from the company and moved to Sacramento to assume his new duties. He and Beverly bought a home in Carmichael and join St. Johns Parish in 1982.

Brother Jim joined the Knights of Columbus in 1949, but, pressure of work, obtaining an education and starting a family led to his withdrawing after just three years. In early 2005, Fr. Hannan convinced him to get active at St. Johns and Brother Gene Gobbo convinced him to rejoin the Knights. James opted to repeat his 1<sup>st</sup> degree held at OLA in February 2005, and followed up with 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> degrees at St. Theresa in Auburn in September 2005. Brother Jim has since been very active in council meetings and activities, currently serving as the Parish Liaison for St. Johns. He has been involved in the annual drive to raise funds to support those with Intellectual Disabilities, worked at the firework stand to provide funds for scholarships, the St. Francis HS BBQ (above picture), and pancake breakfast fund raisers to support various activities of our four parishes. During 2006 and 2007 he undertook the responsibility of coordinating a work force of Council brothers to maintain the new kitchen facilities at St. Johns Tralee Center on a temporary basis until the parish could establish a permanent maintenance service.

The members of the Arden-Carmichael Council are indeed honored and proud to have James Hagarty as a member of the Council.

THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

A constitution is a written set of rules that govern an organization. It can be very short or long. The Babylonian King, Hammurabi, for example, codified laws on a rock column in 3,600 lines of cuneiform over 1700 years before Christ. The code addresses such issues as business, family, labor, property, and injuries, including the famous "an eye for an eye".

The Ten Commandments is one of the simplest constitutions. It is short with little interpretation. The commandments are divided into two parts, the rather long three commandments of God and seven short social commandments, some only four words long such as, you shall not murder, or you shall not steal.

When a constitution lacks detailed instructions, a means must be made to interpret the document. In the time of Moses, a body was created called the Sanhedrin, which was given the authority to interpret the constitution. With the beginning of Christianity, almost immediately a conflict rose between the "Moses Laws" and the New Christian Law. At the Jerusalem Conference, (only two decades after Christ's death) the apostles determined that some of the Old Laws were outmoded and the Apostles, not the Sanhedrin, would be the interpreters of the "Law".

About three hundred years later, when Constantine asked for the "constitution" of the Catholic Church, he was given the Gospels, Acts, Letters and Revelation. This was like an amendment to the Old Testament and the Commandments. The Church then began describing Christian Law in light of the "Old" and "New" Testament, Tradition and the Magisterium (teaching role) of the Church.

The constitution of Islam, the Koran, was supposed to have existed eternally with Allah and be perfect, unchangeable, in Arabic and not translatable. There is no central interpreter or any way to update or change these rules, which leaves the Islamic people locked in time, living with rules established for ancient desert tribes and loath to accept modern changes.

In 1787, the US Constitution was adopted. Three years later it was amended ten times with the Bill of Rights. Since then, it has been amended 17 more times. Without the changes, there would still be slavery and women could not vote. Even with the amendments, there still is an interpretive body, the Courts, to explain what the law means. Some see the Constitution as a living body, subject to change with new situations, while others, who are strict constructionists, claim any changes must be imbedded in the original Constitution.

Just as the Catholics deny the right of the Sanhedrin to interpret 'laws' for the Christians, Protestant denied the right of Catholics to interpret 'laws' for the Protestants. They then went back to the constitution, the Bible, as the source for laws. Fundamentalists interpret the Bible very literally and view the Bible as complete, perfect and without possibility of error. Like the Islamic and the Koran, they are locked in time and reluctant to adapt to change.

There is considerable debate in Christian circles as to whether the Scriptures were intended as a guide written in a chronological form or a constitution with specific mandates. The closest parallel to the commandments in the Gospels are the Beatitudes, which describe how blessed it is to follow the spirit of the Gospels.

A conservative Vatican I established the concept of infallibility of the Pope. About seventy years later, a more liberal Vatican II changed some of the long held venerable traditions. Many Catholics still struggle to understand the heart of the Church, its constitution, within these changes.
