**Columbus - Internet Improvement**

We now have a new and interesting tool available for all members. I encourage those of you with Internet access to visit our web site, [www.kofc.org](http://www.kofc.org), explore the enhancements, and acquaint yourself with the other features.

The site now includes an "insurance calculator." This popular tool allows you, in the privacy of your own home, to answer some very basic questions about assets, debts, existing coverage, and your family protection needs. With amazing speed, the calculator determines where you stand in regard to your life insurance portfolio. An interesting and entertaining process ... but not meant to replace an "in-person" evaluation by your assigned, professional, Field Agent.

The calculator gives you a ballpark figure, and when there is a need or a question you can call your Knights of Columbus Field Agent. Simply tell him you have been on the site, and what you have found, and he will be happy to meet with you, answer your questions and do a complete needs analysis, at no charge. This visit will be time well spent and should be repeated annually as an update.

Have fun with the calculator. It is an educating experience. But don't lose sight of the fact that although you can learn a lot about medical needs on the Internet, you still want a professional for diagnosis and treatment. The same applies to your family protection package.

**CHAPLAIN EMERITUS MESSAGE**

*Reprint from June 2003 Message:* My Friends, the Holy Season of Easter ended on Pentecost Sunday, May 30th. We are now in Ordinary Time until the first Sunday of Advent. This is a time devoted to the mystery of Christ in all its fullness. Sunday becomes the day of celebration, the first day of the week, the day, Jesus, the Lord of Life, rose from the dead. This is the day on which we proclaim to the world what we believe.

Three other days in June are worthy of our consideration. Sunday, June 13<sup>th</sup>, is the Feast of the Body and Blood of Christ. Here we profess our faith in the real presence of Jesus, Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity, in the Eucharist, under the appearances of bread and wine. On June 18<sup>th</sup>, we celebrate the Feast of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, on which we recall the great love of Jesus for us, symbolized by His heart, pierced as He lay dying on the Cross.

June 29<sup>th</sup> features the celebration of Saints Peter and Paul; Peter, chosen by Christ as head of the Church, despite his denying Jesus three times; Paul, the apostle of the gentiles, chosen by Jesus despite his persecution of the Christians. Perhaps we are like Peter and Paul in some manner. Yet Jesus has chosen us to be his witnesses in our world, to be his hands, his voice.

As our Columbian year ends and a new year begins, may you continue the good work of our Order.

FILIPINO SOCIAL/DINNER

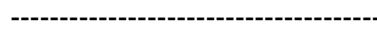


PONCE MARQUEZ, PGK, CHAIRMAN
